#### INTRODUCTION

Creating high-wage jobs for Seminole County is essential to Seminole County's future prosperity. Through strategic partnerships, business development services, business retention and expansion programs and professional and technical outreach, County leadership has continued to foster a business climate that cultivates quality development.

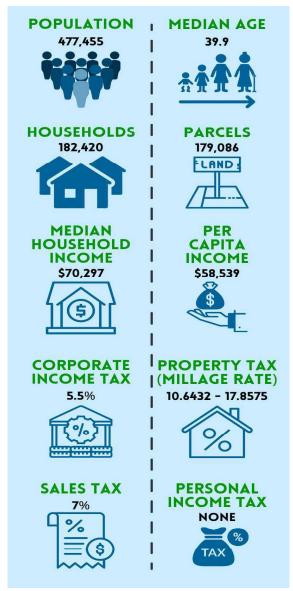
Industry growth in Seminole has taken several forms. The County is home to corporate headquarters such as American Automobile Association (AAA), Mitsubishi Power Systems, Scholastic Book Fairs, and leading private employers including Deloitte Consulting, Verizon, Chase, BNY Mellon Bank, and Convergys.

Seminole County is uniquely positioned to offer a variety of connectivity options, including access to major roadways such as I-4, SR 417, Florida Turnpike, and I-95. The Orlando Sanford International Airport (SFB), which recently completed a \$60 million expansion project. Nearly 3 million passengers travel through SFB to-and-from more than 80 -and growing- non-stop destinations. CSX rail runs throughout the County and offers access to multimodal transportation such as the expanding SunRail network.

Though Seminole is the third smallest county geographically in the state, it is home to diverse group of seven cities (Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Lake Mary, Longwood, Oviedo, Sanford, and Winter Springs). Each possesses unique appeal and a commitment to economic growth mixed with a devotion to maintaining the local culture. Additionally, with 23 major colleges and universities within a 50-mile radius, Seminole is home to a diverse and well-trained workforce; 43% of County residents have a degree.

Seminole County Economic Development manages various business development incentives in partnership with Seminole's constituent cities, the Orlando Economic Partnership, and Enterprise Florida, including the Jobs Growth Incentive Fund (JGI). In partnership with organizations such as Seminole State College Center for Economic Development, Prospera, and the UCF-Winter Springs Incubator, more than 4,500 clients, 296 business start-ups, and 1,750 jobs were created or retained.

#### JOBS GROWTH INCENTIVE OVERVIEW

This document contains an overview of the Seminole County Jobs Growth Incentive Trust Fund program (JGI) and program application. The JGI is a tool designed to both attract new businesses to Seminole County and support existing businesses with expansion opportunities. Program support is aimed at specific target industries that are beneficial to the citizens of Seminole County.

Jobs Growth Incentive funds can be used for any legitimate business expenses pertaining to a new location or expansion of a target industry or business. Expenses that are eligible for award include: impact and permit fees, relocation costs, equipment purchases, land acquisition, building construction, loan interest pay down, leasehold improvements or any other legitimate business expense as determined by the Board of County Commissioners.

The Jobs Growth Incentive Fund provides monetary incentives for eligible target industries:

#### CRITERIA AND APPLICATION

A company must apply to Seminole County Economic Development prior to making a decision to locate or expand in Seminole County. Final decisions made on applications are based on available information provided at that time. Changes to application content must be made in writing to Seminole County Economic Development.

In order to qualify for consideration under the program, the applicant must:

- Submit the official JGI application provided by Seminole County Economic Development before making a decision to locate or expand in Seminole County;
- Demonstrate that the incentive will make a material difference in the company's decision to locate or expand within the County;
- Pay an average annual wage that is at least 100% of the Seminole County Average Annual Wage (AAW). Current AAW is \$57,624;
- Wage requirement is determined by Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Labor Market Statistics Center, Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages Program, in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics;
- Requirements are effective January 1 of each calendar year. All incentive applications received on or after January 1 will be subject to wage requirements for that calendar year. Incentive applications processed prior to January 1 will utilize AAW applicable at time of submission.

#### CRITERIA AND APPLICATION (CONTINUED)

Lease payments-section 218.17 (j.)-The County will consider lease payments as a measure for capital investment. A long-term lease represents the company's commitment to the site and the facility which would not have been created had the company not selected that area.

Seminole County Economic Development will shepherd businesses and communities through the application process, ensuring that the company and community understand what is required for a complete, effective application.

Seminole County Economic Development submits the application and relevant documentation for Seminole County Board of County Commission approval, who make the final decision on the project.

#### **AWARD**

- \$1,000 per job for businesses paying at least 100% of the Average Annual Wage.
- Businesses that fall within a high impact sector or pay 200% of the Average Annual Wage, may be eligible for \$2,000 per job. Awards of this nature will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

If a company is approved to receive an award they must:

- Enter into an Agreement with Seminole County outlining project specifics and details including capital investment and job creation;
- Provide annual documentation for up to five years. Reports include: number or jobs created and maintained, capital investment status, and the average annual salary of new employees.

The following terms used in this Application have the meanings set forth below:

AFFILIATE – An entity that is controlled, directly or indirectly, by the ultimate parent entity of such person.

APPLICANT – The entity(ies) that will satisfy all job creation and capital investment requirements under the incentive agreement with the Department and which are applying on or amending this Application.

BROWNFIELD Site with a Brownfield Site Rehabilitation Agreement – Has the meaning ascribed to such term in Section 288.107 of the Florida Statutes.

CONTROL — The power, directly or indirectly, to direct the management or policies of a company, whether through ownership of securities, by contract, or otherwise. Any person or entity that (i) is a director, general partner or officer exercising executive responsibility (or having similar status or functions); (ii) directly or indirectly has the right to vote 50% or more of a class of a voting security or has the power to sell or direct the sale of 50% or more of a class of voting securities; or (iii) in the case of a partner-ship, has the right to receive upon dissolution, or has contributed, 50% or more of the capital, is presumed to control that company.

DEPARTMENT – The Department of Economic Opportunity.

FELONY – For jurisdictions that do not differentiate between a felony and a misdemeanor, a felony is an offense punishable by a sentence of at least one year imprisonment and/or a fine of at least \$1,000. The term also includes a general court martial.

NAICS – Those classifications contained in the North American Industry Classification System, as published in 2012 by the Office of Management and Budget, Executive Office of the President, and updated from time to time.

ORDER – A written directive issued pursuant to statutory authority and procedures, including orders of denial, suspension, or revocation; does not include special stipulations, undertakings or agreements relating to payments, limitations on activity or other restrictions unless they are included in an order.

PRINCIPAL EXECUTIVE OFFICER – With respect to any entity, such entity's chief executive officer, chief financial officer, chief operations officer or any person who performs similar functions regardless of title.

PROJECT – Has the meaning ascribed to such term in Section 288.106 of the Florida Statutes.

RURAL AREA OF OPPORTUNITY – Has the meaning ascribed to such term in Section 288.0656 of the Florida Statutes.
